
# KS1 CRICKET TASTER SESSION

As part of their Science topic on circulation. This week the children learnt about the different components that make up our blood. They then represented these with different food items to make their own 'blood'.

























# THIS WEEK YEAR 3 - PLANTS

# THIS WEEK YEAR 1-- WALKER ART GALLERY AND WORLD MUSEUM

Walker Art Gallery:

The children looked at artwork by George Stubbs, a painter who was famous for painting animals including horses. The children identified the details in the painting including movement and light and dark. They also discussed the feelings of the animals and how this was shown through the expressions on their faces. Bethany who ran the art workshop explained how techniques had been used by the artist to create drama and suspense including the use of colour.

Bethany took us into another section of the gallery and the children looked at some contemporary artwork and learnt how the purpose of this artwork isn't always to make something look real it can be a representation of something to create a feeling. The children identified the patterns in the artwork and created their own piece of artwork in groups through the use of mark making. This was inspired by an artist called Tim Head. Bethany took the children to the sculpture gallery and the children created their own sculpture to take home out of modelling clay.

World Museum:

The children enjoyed visiting the various floors of the museum including the dinosaurs, the bug house and the aquarium.

The children were so well behaved and enthusiastic, sharing what they had enjoyed and what they had learnt.

#### **Secret Present Shop**


